Overcoming Negative Views of Christians/Christianity

How do others know that you are a Christian without you telling them? Do you think most people you interact with have a positive or negative view of Christians and Christianity?

You have most likely heard of the fable titled, "The Boy Who Cried Wolf". Just in case you haven't, let me tell you the story:

A young boy was asked by his father to watch over their flock of sheep while he went away on business. He gave him instructions on how to take care of the flock and warned him of a wolf he had seen lately that had tried to kill some of the sheep. He told his son that if he saw the wolf to yell "WOLF! WOLF!" as loud as he could and the villagers would come to the rescue. It didn't take long for the boy to get bored watching the sheep roam around the fields. He began to wonder what would happen if there really was a wolf threatening the flock. So, at the top of his lungs he yelled, "WOLF! WOLF!" Within minutes, several villagers arrived with pitchforks ready to take on the dangerous animal. The boy thought the villager's reaction was hilarious, and couldn't stop laughing at the look on their faces when they realized there was no wolf.

Soon after the villagers returned to their homes and work, they boy got bored again and thought he would have some more fun. Again, he yelled, "WOLF! WOLF!" And the villagers returned, ready for the fight. This time, the boy thought it was even funnier, and the villagers were really angry at being tricked again. They scolded the boy and stormed back to the village.

While the boy was still chuckling over having tricked the villagers a second time, out of the forest came a huge wolf with dinner on his mind. The boy panicked and began yelling ""WOLF! WOLF!" over and over. However, this time, no one came to the rescue. The villagers had grown weary of the boy's tricks, and they refused to fall for them a third time.

Without the help of the villagers, the boy watched helplessly as the wolf killed several of the sheep, then turned on him.

The moral of the story is that we should not lie. A liar will not be believed, even when he tells the truth.

Many people have negative impressions of Christians and Christianity. These negative attitudes have many different causes, but one of the main reasons for their negative views is that they perceive Christians to be "liars" ...we do not live out what we preach. We have "cried wolf" by saying one thing and doing another. Now, when we are serious about sharing the gospel, our words are seen as hollow.

How can we overcome some of these negative views of Christianity in our community so that non-believers will take us seriously when we talk to them about the gospel? Let's look at three areas that the Bible says are important ways others can know we are Christians and that we are serious about our faith. We will start our look at each area by asking a question.

Question #1: Are we, as Christians, united in purpose and lifestyle in our home, church and community?

Jesus asked the Father for unity among believers. In John 17:20-21 NIV Jesus prays: "My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me."

Jesus asked that we would be "one" with each other and "one" with god because He knew that by being united, people would know that He was sent by the Father and that we are His true followers.

Why do sports teams have uniforms? Because they want everyone to know that they are on the same team and are working together to accomplish a goal...winning. What can we do as The Body of Christ that would identify us as a team that is working together to accomplish a goal...The Hope of Christ in every person?

It all starts with us wearing the same "uniform": "So in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus." Galatians 3: 26-28

Question #2: Do we truly love each other and love every person in our community?

Jesus summed up the entire Law of the Old Testament in one sentence: Love the Lord your God and love your neighbor. In John 13:35 NIV he told the disciples that, "everyone will know that

you are my disciples, if you love one another."

As Christians, we could teach the Bible and speak the gospel 24/7/365, but if we do not do so in love, we are only making noise. Unbelievers will either learn to ignore the noise, or it will irritate them into responding unpleasantly. The best way to avoid simply being noise, is through relationship evangelism. If your goal is to build a relationship with someone first, then you develop a friendship and a trust that can lead to opportunities to share the gospel. You've heard the saying: People don't care what you know until they know that you care. We must love those who we share the gospel with and avoid being noise makers.

Question #3: Do our words and actions proclaim Christ or deny that we know Him?

Jesus set the standard for what it means to be a Christian. In Matthew 10:35 (ESV) he tells us, "whoever denies me before men, I also will deny before my Father who is in heaven."

We, as Christians, are not likely to stand up and public and say, "I deny Jesus and all He stands for", but remember our actions speak louder than our words. The people in our communities are looking more at what we do than what we say.

It's easier to deny Christ with our actions than you might think. We can be disrespectful to a neighbor or a boss. We can say we follow Christ yet let something or someone else rule over us. We can claim to be a Christian yet not love the "untouchables" in our community. When we say we are Christians and we do not act like Christians, we are denying that our faith is real...and ultimately that we don't believe Christ is who we say He is.

So, how do we overcome negative views of Christians and Christianity?

It starts with us being united. Being here together is part of that unity, as is sharing a desire to see the Hope of Christ in every person. We must support and encourage one another across denominations and among different churches. We must come together on what we all have in common...the Cross. We are united in our message...the message of the gospel.

We come together in unity, but we must reach out in love. If the Church is known only as that group of people that loves everyone, we are living out our faith and impacting the world. Unconditional love is something that very few of people have ever experienced. We must be intentional about loving others.

It all comes together with us living out our faith, and letting our actions proclaim Christ and not deny Him. When we are united as the Body of Christ, loving others unconditionally and living out our faith, we will have opportunities to share the ultimate in unity and unconditional love...the Gospel!

Here are three challenges I leave each of you with today:

Unity: Is there a brother or sister in Christ that you have wronged or that you do not get along with? If so, repair that relationship. Start by apologizing, and then work to mend the wounds and rebuild the relationship.

Love: Begin a relationship with someone that most people ignore or are afraid of. You will be an example of unconditional love and might just find a new best friend in the process.

Proclaim: Identify one area of your life where you are not acting as God wants you to. Ask God to reveal it to you and then give you the strength and wisdom to correct it.

Development of Church Renewal Network

Thank you for taking the time out of your day to read up on the latest news related to church health. For our June issue of The Messenger I am choosing to present an idea that will assist us in the task of equipping our churches with leaders for today and the next generation.

For the past year, we have been working diligently to pull together a team whose responsibilities are to lay the groundwork for a network where the focus is on churches in need of renewal whether through a process of revitalization or replanting. Most of this team has been assembled and has begun its work. The two main purposes of this group are as follows:

- 1) To develop the process that assists church leadership from the point of Discovery (a time of assessment to determine a "starting point") to renewal (a functional congregation of Christ followers who practice healthy evangelism methods and replicable discipleship, to name a few traits).
- 2) To develop the creation of a Leadership Pipeline. This "pipeline" will be made up of those individuals called to various areas of who desire a learning path that will best equip them for their calling by seeking out every resource, then help them utilize these resources. Our pipeline is being designed to assist those feeling called to serve in the revitalization/replanting ministry of our churches.

The various learning paths available are the role of pastor, worship pastor, and small groups/education/connections pastor. Each "recruit" will be assessed for their acceptance in the program. Upon successful completion of the assessment, the student will receive a syllabus which includes all the necessary requirements to complete the program which consists off a learning cohort related to their ministry pathway, personal coaching, and a 6-12-month apprenticeship.

Pastors and church leaders, we need your assistance in identifying recruits for this pipeline. We also want to hear from you if you want to learn more about how we can come alongside your ministry if you are finding yourself losing ground. It's a pleasure to serve you and I look forward to hearing from you!

TO YOUR HEALTH

The human back can quickly become such a problem. We say "put your back into it", but it is so easy to have your back go out! When we resort to surgical repairs it seems to go on and on and on. More surgeries follow too often. Regardless of our age or muscularity, here are some precautions to take to preserve the life of a healthy back. (This list is far from complete.)

1) Stretch. Always before heavy lifting or athletic endeavors. In fact, when you first wake up in the morning lay on your back in bed and pull your knees to your chest. With hands on your shins, pull your thighs tight against your chest and hold for five seconds. Do this several times before you start your day. Never raise up in bed and then spin to the edge; rather, roll to your side first and then sit up from that position. Such a simple thing can save you great pain! I always stretch before shower and shave time. I sit on the floor making a V with my legs. Walk your fingers down the tops of each leg to your toes. Try to keep your knees locked, but that may not happen at first. Do this several times with each leg. Then reach straight ahead and walk your fingers on the floor as far as you can reach. These simple exercises will loosen up your lower back and make you start your day in better condition.

2) Warm up. Bowling, golf, swimming and weight lifting really need Pg.13 stretching before engaging in the activities. Resist the temptation to get in a hurry and skip that part! You will enhance your performance and save your back.

For golf, I typically do some toe touches and then reaches through my stance and to each side. I do twists with increasing distances. I begin with easy swing motions and eventually build up to full driver swings. Each sport has its own best stretches and warm-ups. For any stretching or exercise routine always consult a medical professional or trainer. Each body can be a bit different.

3) Use common sense. When lifting heavier loads keep the back upright and lift with the strength of your legs. Do not reach at awkward angles to lift weights like mulch or dog food. Such extensions into a trunk can put unusual strain on an unprepared back. Beware of going down smooth, wooden steps. A fall can have your back land on sharp-edged stairs and the damage to your back could be severe. Sitting at a desk most of the day can place a different kind of strain on ones back. During the day do some stretches and get up for a walk around the facility every hour. Take care of this vital part of your human temple. Enter your retirement years in as good a shape as possible for some wonderful sunset years!








June 14th 9 AM to 2 PM
