That's the number of people who die each day without Jesus. Each month over 4.7 million people step into a Christless eternity as 7,327 people groups (4.6 billion people) remain unreached! The only solution is the Gospel, and we are blessed to be part of one of the largest missionary sending agencies in the world. Consider these 2021 facts from our International Mission Board:

3,650 Missionaries Supported
93 New People Groups and Places Engaged
592,408 Heard the Gospel
176,795 New Believers
107,701 Baptisms
22,744 New Churches Planted

Because of your faithful giving, these missionaries can serve fulltime without having to return home to raise support. I can't wait to see what God has done in 2022!

If you've never given to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering, I want to challenge you to give at least \$10 for each member of your family. If your church has had the same LMCO goal for a while, consider raising it at least \$100. One person can cover that increase! You and I will likely spend much more than that on gifts that will last only a short time. By comparison the Gospel makes an eternal impact!

The Acts 2:17 Initiative was officially launched during the Tuesday afternoon session (Nov. 15) of the annual meeting of the Tennessee Baptist Convention held during The Summit at Bellevue Baptist Church, Cordova.

The Acts 2:17 Initiative will provide Tennessee Baptists across the state the opportunity to speak into future priorities of the state convention. Messengers gathered in small groups to begin the process and 24 other listening sessions are scheduled across Tennessee beginning in January of 2023. Mountain View Baptist Church in Johnson City is the location of the January 16 (6:30 PM) meeting location. Visit thbaptist.org/Acts217 for regular updated information.

Ryan Keaton, next generations specialist for the TBMB, shared what the future will look like for Tennessee Baptists. "There have been times in our past where we have had plans, events changed what we thought the future would be, and our plans had to adapt," Keaton observed. He encouraged Tennessee Baptists "to dream with us as we have the opportunity to look ahead at the future."

Keaton observed that trend assessments are essential for organizations to proactively plan for the future. "Our desire is to be proactive," Keaton said. The TBMB specialist noted that visioning is not a new concept. "Jesus was a futurist and encouraged His followers to look to the future and be prepared for it."

Keaton cited five major trends that Tennessee Baptists need to be aware of as they plan for the future: population, hardships, economic, societal, and church. (See entire article, linked below, for important details.)

Keaton acknowledged that "we can't do anything about the future in our own strength, but God can. We have great hope in being in the presence of God and seeking His preferable future. God has placed us here for this time and for this purpose. May we seek Him in ways that future generations can stand on the shoulders of our faithfulness."

Boone Trail Baptist will again hold its live nativity at the Barn at Boone Falls. This year's dates are December 15, 16, and 17 from 6pm to 9pm.

We would love to invite you and your church to partner with us in one of two ways:

- 2. Come help us! We need
 - · Able-bodied builders to assemble Bethlehem the week prior to the nativity
 - · Bethlehemite citizens walking the streets, selling wares, and engaging guests
 - Choir singers for the angel choir (singing many standard Christian carols)

Last year more than 3500 people came through the free event where they experienced what it may have been like in the Bethlehem marketplace the night Jesus was born. Once again you'll see church members dressed in time-period clothing walking the streets, attending their booths, selling their goods and tending to their animals (sheep, donkeys, chickens, llamas etc.). You'll see Roman soldiers taking down names for the census, Herod in his palace, angels singing and, finally Mary, Joseph and Jesus the Savior. Along the straw-covered streets families will hear the Christmas story broadcast through their car radio as well as the sounds of a live church choir.

A large star will shine above the venue held by a 100-foot crane. The star should be visible from a long-range in the Boones Creek area.

In addition to driving through in cars, visitors will have additional options that will move the crowd through more quickly. Guests are welcome to park at Meade Tractor and walk the route, or ride on covered passenger trailers (donated from Fender's Farm). Large groups can also reserve spots on the trailers. As a treat to visitors, families will receive cookies and hot chocolate to enjoy along the route and, at the end, guests will be given a personalized gift that reminds us of the reason Jesus came and that he knows us by name.

Boone Trail Pastor John Wilson says the response to last year's event was overwhelming. "We had such amazing feedback of the blessing families received from our event. They said it really brought the true meaning of Christmas to life. Our hope is that this event is again a refuge from the typical commercialized holiday rush to just step back in time and realize the miracle that was Christ's birth, death and resurrection."
